
Stefaan Hermans

Dr. Fiona Kernan

Fiona Kernan, with a B.Sc. from University College Dublin and Ph.D. from Trinity College Dublin, joined the European Research Council Executive Agency as a research programme officer in 2009. She currently works on the ERC Advanced Investigator Grant scheme. Previous to this, Fiona Kernan worked for the European Science Foundation and the European Commission's Directorate for Research and Innovation.



Prof. Patrick Cunningham

Patrick Cunningham is Chief Scientific Adviser to the Irish Government and Professor of Animal Genetics in Trinity College, University of Dublin. He was formerly Deputy Director (Research) in An Foras Talúntais (1980 - 1988), visiting Professor at the Economic Development Institute, World Bank (1988) and Director of the Animal Production and Health Division, Food & Agriculture Organisation of the UN, Rome (1990 - 93). He has published extensively on the genetics of domesticated animals. He is co-founder of the biotechnology company IdentiGEN. He has been President of the European and World Associations of Animal Production, and served on the European Life Sciences Group which advised Commissioner Busquin. In 2008 he led the Irish team behind the successful bid to host the "European City of Science" event in Dublin, in 2012.



Dr. Iain Cameron

Iain Cameron is head of the Research Councils UK (RCUK) Research Careers and Diversity Unit. His unit is responsible for co-ordinating the generic aspects of research careers and related diversity issues across the UK Research Councils and has specific responsibility for developing, implementing and monitoring the Skills Training agenda and for implementation by the UK Research Councils of the recommendations of the "Roberts' Report – SET for Success". He works closely with the UK Government Office of Science and Innovation (OSI) and liaises with the UK Higher Education Funding Councils and other funders. Iain represents the UK on the EC Steering Group on Human Resources and Mobility and participates in several international networks.



Dr. Chris Thompson

Chris completed his EPSRC funded PhD at the University of Sheffield in 2007 in Software Engineering, where he remained for a postdoctoral position looking at how teams develop software. At the University of Hull in 2009 he undertook research in eLearning solutions for doctoral and postdoctoral training. He joined the committee of UKRSA in 2010 and co-authored their report "Understanding research staff associations and their impact". With the birth of his first child he has taken a career break and is currently teaching part time for both the Open University and University of Hull.



Dr. David Finger

L. David Finger, Ph.D. is currently a Marie Curie International Incoming Fellow (MC-IIF) at the University of Sheffield and a member of the Board of Director (BoD) of the National Postdoctoral Association (NPA). Before becoming an MC-IIF, David was a postdoctoral fellow at the City of Hope (COH) Beckman Research Institute near Los Angeles. David earned his B.A. in biochemistry from Ithaca College. After a three month internship in the Department of Vaccine Serology at Merck, Inc. in West Point, PA, David moved to Los Angeles to earn his doctorate in Biochemistry and Molecular Biology at University of California, Los Angeles (UCLA). Before becoming a member of the BoD of the NPA, David previously served as Chair (2009) and Vice Chair (2010) of the Outreach Committee in addition to volunteering (2007-2009) for several other sub-committees of the Meetings Committee.

Dr. Conor O'Carroll

As head of the Research Office at the Irish Universities Association (IUA.) Dr. O'Carroll is responsible for the coordination of research policy across all seven Irish universities. He is also responsible for the FP7 Marie Curie, Research Potential Programmes and Network of Mobility Centres in Ireland. He represents Ireland on a number of European bodies responsible for the development of research careers (currently on the European Research Area review committee).



Prof. Dolores Cahill

Prof. Cahill is Professor of Translational Science at UCD. She was appointed by Irish Minister of Trade, Industry and Enterprise as Member of the Advisory Science Council (ASC) 2005-present (www.sciencecouncil.ie) and is currently the chairperson on the Advisory Science Council Task Force on Researchers Careers. In addition Prof. Cahill is and Independent Observer and Rapporteur for the Evaluation of the European Union Framework 7 (FP7) Health Theme.



Dr. Stephen Simpson

Dr. Stephen Simpson joined SFI on 31 July 2008 from the internationally-renowned "Science" journal based in Cambridge, UK, where he held the position of Associate Editor from 2000 to 2005 and Senior Editor since 2005. Along with his particular experience in areas of biomedicine, immunology, human genetics, molecular cell biology, cancer and HIV, Dr Simpson came to SFI with a comprehensive publication record and wide international representation, along with experience of research leadership and collaboration with academia and industry. He currently holds the position of Director of lifesciences within SFI.





Prof. Nicholas Canny

Professor Nicholas Canny, is Director of the Moore Institute for Research in the Humanities at National University of Ireland, Galway, and President of the Royal Academy from 2008-11. His 1976 study The Elizabethan Conquest of Ireland: a Pattern Established, 1565-76 brought him to international attention. It was awarded the Irish Historical Research prize, as was his more recent work on Irish History: Making Ireland British, 1580-1650 (Oxford, 2001). He served in Spring 2005 as professeur invité at the École des Hautes Études, Paris and in 2005-6 Parnell Senior Research Fellow at Magdalene College Cambridge, He was in 1995, elected member of the Academia Europaea, in 2005 as a Corresponding Fellow of the British Academy, and in 2007 as a Member of the American Philosophical Society.



Kevin McCarthy

Kevin McCarthy was appointed as an Assistant Secretary in the then Department of Education and Science in June 2008. He has overall responsibility for higher education policy within the Department. He has previously held positions of Director, Ministerial Policy Adviser and Principal Officer within the Department and has had various responsibilities across the areas of Finance, Corporate Services, Central Policy and Higher Education. Prior to joining the Department in 2002, Kevin worked in the Department of Health and Children and in the health sector.



Prof. Orla Feely

Orla Feely received the B.E. degree in electronic engineering from University College Dublin in 1986, and the M.S. and Ph.D. degrees in electrical engineering from the University of California, Berkeley, in 1990 and 1992, respectively. Since 1992 she has been with the Department of Electronic and Electrical Engineering at University College Dublin, where she is currently an Associate Professor. Her research interests lie in the area of nonlinear dynamics of electronic circuits. She is a Council Member of the Irish Research Council for Science, Engineering and Technology.



Karen Hynes

"Karen Hynes is manager of Innovation Policy in Forfás. Forfás is Ireland's policy advisory body for enterprise and science and provides research and secretariat support for Advisory Science Council on Science Technology and Innovation".



Dr. Tennie Videler

Tennie Videler is a programme manager for Vitae, an organisation set up to support postgraduate researchers and research staff. Previously she was a researcher herself, completing a doctorate and several years of post-doctoral research in different fields of structural biology. Tennie joined Vitae in the 2008 and is the person dedicated to making contact with researchers. She writes and commissions resources for researchers and speaks at events. Tennie runs bespoke researcher career related workshops. This year she has been involved in setting up the UK research staff association, UKRSA.



Aidan Hodson

Aidan Hodson heads a unit within the Office of Science, Technology and Innovation with responsibility for EU and International science and technology policy as well as for funding and policy oversight of Science Foundation Ireland and, following its transfer to the Department in 2010, the Programme for Research in Third Level Institutions. Aidan previously served in the relevant Departments dealing with fisheries, telecommunications and a number of energy-related areas.
